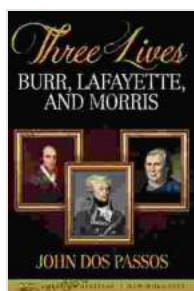


Three Lives: Burr, Lafayette, and Morris

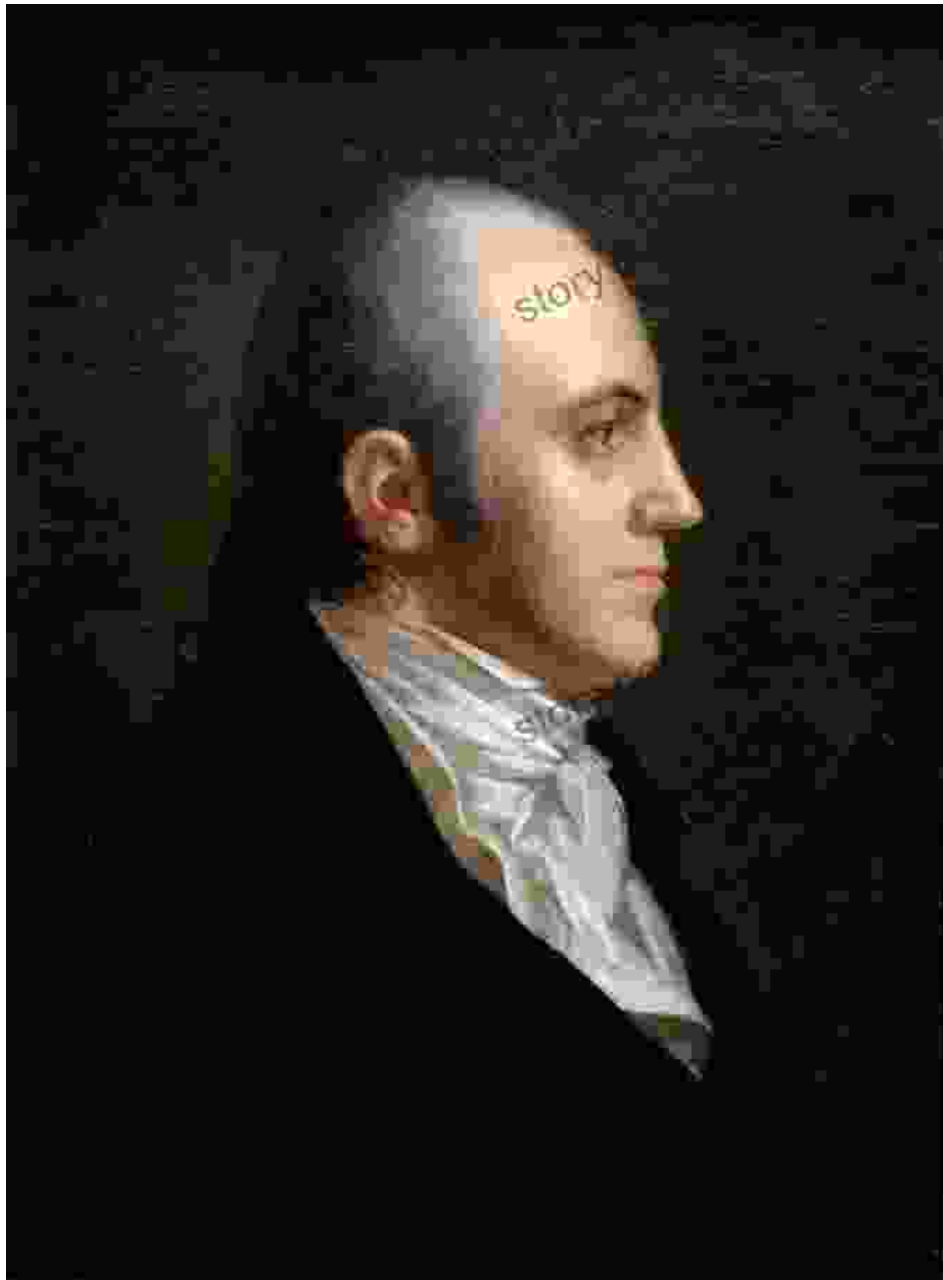

Aaron Burr

Aaron Burr was born in Newark, New Jersey, in 1756. His father, the Reverend Aaron Burr, was a prominent Presbyterian minister. 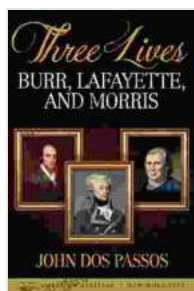
The Intertwined Lives of Burr, Lafayette, and Morris

three men worked together to achieve a common goal: the birth of the United States of America.

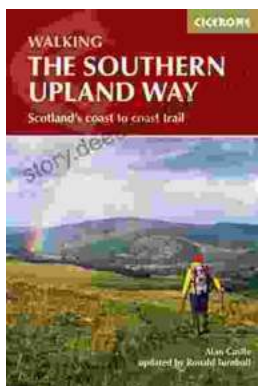

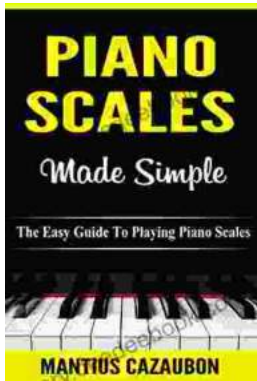
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
